## THE CORNELL LAW SCHOOL

In view of the changes in economic, social, and political conditions which are characteristic of the times, the Faculty has begun a thorough-going study of the School's curriculum with a view to its basic revision.

The Law School's academic year 1943-44 will consist of three terms of fifteen weeks each. While the opening dates of these terms have not as yet been definitely fixed, it is probable that they will be June 28, 1943, October 25, 1943, and February 28, 1944. It is expected that eight of the regular members of the Faculty will be in residence during these periods of instruction.
